When you read fiction, you should think about and analyze key elements of plot, character, setting, theme, and point of view. When you read nonfiction, you should think about and analyze facts, what you learn, and how you learn it.

As you explore titles to read this summer, you may want to start a list of titles you would like to read in the future. It is essential that parents and guardians play an active role in their child's reading and in deciding what is or is not appropriate for their child's specific maturity and reading levels. Please refrain from choosing titles that you have already read and those which we will cover in our curriculum, which include, but are not limited to: *The Adoration of Jenna Fox, All of the Above, Ghost, Fish in a Tree, Nine, Ten: A September 11 Story, Orbiting Jupiter, Lily and Dunkin, The Five People You Meet in Heaven, Out of my Mind, 12 Angry Men, and The Taming of the Shrew.*

For Regular Academic Subjects (English, Foreign Language, Math, Science, Social Studies):

- Binders- 1-inch binders can hold materials for individual subjects, 3-inch binders can hold materials for 2-3 subjects
- Binder 1.5 or 2.0 inch three ring binder. Foreign Language
- Folders
- Loose Leaf
- Dividers (for all subjects)
- Pens (black or blue ink)
- Highlighters
- Post-It Notes
- Pencils (required for all math classes).
- Large eraser (required for all math classes).
- Pencil Pouch

Additional:

- 2 Composition Books (1 for Spanish, 1 for Health).
- All 8th grade students: Scientific calculator (Texas Instrument 30X II S preferred). Most students should already have this calculator, as it was a required purchase in 7th grade.
- Additional purchase if enrolled in Algebra I (Integrated Algebra) Texas Instruments Graphing Calculator (Model: TI-84 Plus). This calculator will also be used for several years at the high School level as well. These calculators are significantly less expensive during the early part of summer.
- 1 additional pocket folders- 1 for Home and Careers and 1 for Health, and a flash drive is strongly recommended.
- Gym clothing for P.E. Shorts, t-shirt active wear to be left in gym locker to change into for P.E. class. Sneakers on P.E. days, too!

M O D E L	Example 1 from <i>The Cay</i> <i>Page 7</i>	setting	Narrow, gables house in Willemstad, Curacao, a Dutch Island off of coast of Venezuela 1942	Author establishes key aspects of the exposition by giving detailed setting information to reader. They are immediately informed of place and war time conflicts impacting the plot.
	Example 2 from <i>The Cay</i> <i>Page 14</i>	Character	"My mother closed her eyes and pulled me up against her thin body. She was like that. One minute, shaking me, the next, holding me."	Author indirectly characterizes mother to show her many concerns about her child through actions. She is both concerned and loving, but also sometimes frustrated with his behavior.

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
