Student Programs Remain in Place Under 2024-2025 Proposed Budget; Staffing Reductions Aligned to Enrollment Decrease

The New Paltz Central School District Board of Education has proposed a budget of \$73,520,671 for the 2024-2025 school year.

A reduction in State Aid, the ending of the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) funding, existing staffing levels despite a decline in enrollment, and the rising costs of goods and services contributed to a very difficult budget situation. After weighing community input, clearly indicating that priority must be placed on protecting student opportunities, the Board adopted the proposed budget, which represents a 2.93 percent increase in spending and carries a projected tax levy increase of 3.63 percent, meeting the New York State (NYS) Tax Cap Formula criteria for a simple majority voter approval of 50 percent plus one.

Additionally, a second proposition will ask voters to approve \$2 million in facility improvements that will be paid for using existing funds that have been saved in District-established reserve accounts, allowing the work to be completed without impacting taxes.

Elections for four Board of Education members will also take place, with six candidates vying for the positions: Jane Farrell, Christopher Bravo, Olivia Treubig, Jason Clark, Glenn LaPolt and Edwin Justin Seweryn. Each voter may vote for any four candidates.

Polls will be open for in-person voting on Tuesday, May 21, from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. at New Paltz High School. Absentee ballots are available for eligible voters who are unable to vote in person. This year, NYS has also enacted a new law making "Early Mail Ballots" available (see details on page 5).

Spending Reductions Largely Related to Decreased Enrollment; Programs Remain Intact

The Board carefully considered many variables as it weighed its options for presenting a budget, including significant enrollment changes and the ability to offset taxpayer costs through the use of fund balance. "A clear priority was to protect student programming," explains Debra Kosinski, Assistant Superintendent for Business. "Even though we are eliminating some positions due to having fewer students, all the services being provided to students will remain. A few may be delivered a little differently, but it was important to the Board that they continue," she adds.

Savings created by right-sizing the District to current enrollment levels provided the path for preserving student opportunities. From 2017-2018, District enrollment decreased by 20 percent (from 2,169 to 1,735 students), while staffing had only been reduced by one percent. The projected enrollment for next year is 1,675, representing another four percent decrease.

To keep programs intact while accommodating for the reduced number of students, the proposed budget eliminates 15 positions across the District, including PreK-12 instructional staff, one librarian, one athletic trainer, and one bus driver. One floating school nurse, one substance abuse counselor, and two social worker positions that had been funded through the expiring ARP grant were also eliminated. Of these 15 positions, 11 are being eliminated through attrition (either the positions are currently vacant or the individuals are retiring or leaving the District).

Additional reductions were made to some facilities projects, printer maintenance, superintendent's conference expenses, musical instrument repair/replacement, classroom furniture, and some BOCES programs. Costs for scheduling substitutes were reduced by reassigning duties, and one behavioral specialist was reduced to three days per week.


room window. Armed with an official adoption certificate, the young learners cared for the bird throughout the learning unit.

The class also collaborated to build "Bird Town" and transformed their classroom into an animal hospital, fostering socialization and problem-solving skills!








Middle School Hosts English as a New Language (ENL) Family Night

2024-2025 Proposed Budget

The proposed budget also replaces two large school buses, one smaller school bus, and one District vehicle, as well as provides funding for a new special education classroom at Duzine Elementary, including one teacher and two teaching aides. This will allow some students currently enrolled in out-of-district programs to attend school in New Paltz, alongside anticipated new enrollees requiring services. Athletic scoreboards will be replaced with monies saved on fuel and snow removal from the current year and summer work for counselors and nurses will be paid out of the remaining ARP funds.

Fund Balance Helps Contain Tax Levy Increase

To help offset the taxpayer cost of preserving programs, the Board is applying \$2,183,876 from the District's fund balance (unused funds from prior years) as revenue for the 2024-2025 budget.

Community Input and Feedback Helped Guide Budget Development

To ensure the community had a voice in the difficult budget decisions, the Board hosted a public "Coffee with the Board Members" session before their March 20 meeting, as well as offered three public comment sessions during the meeting to gather input on the discussion. As a result of community feedback, a social worker position initially slated for removal was restored and focus remained on preserving student programs while minimizing employee layoffs.

"It is important for all taxpayers to know that the Board members really took this job seriously," notes Superintendent Stephen Gratto. "They were well informed as they made these difficult decisions. They listened to the public and each other, asked good questions, debated the topics, and came up with the best plan possible."

Proposition 2: Permission to Spend \$2 Million Already in Reserves with No Tax Implication

Voters will see a second proposition on the ballot allowing the District to allocate an additional \$2 million, with no increase to the tax levy, to fund facilities improvements. Proposed updates include replacing the elevators in the Middle School and High School and replacing the existing fire alarm systems to meet NYS code in Duzine Elementary, Lenape Elementary, and the High School. Additional high priority updates may be included if there are any funds remaining after completing this work.

The \$2 million project is being paid for by using funds that are already saved in District reserves, which were funded in part with a one-time \$1,216,899 building aid payment received in June. Even though spending these funds will not impact the tax levy, NYS law requires voter approval.

Contingency Budget Would Require Approximately \$1.7 Million in Additional Cuts

Should voters not approve the proposed budget, the District has the option to present the same proposal or a modified version to voters for a second time. If the budget fails a second time, or if the District opts not to hold a second vote, NYS law requires adoption of a contingency budget, where spending is set at a predetermined level and certain expenses are not permitted by law.

A contingency budget would result in the reduction of an additional \$1.7 million and include the elimination of all bus purchases, new equipment, field trips, free facility use by the public, and use of reserve funds for the proposed \$2 million facilities improvements. Teacher-to-student ratios will increase, some course offerings will be limited, and expenses for student supplies and resources will be reduced.

Harmonizing Futures: NPHS Students Elevate Musical Skills with SUNY Ulster Community Band









ABOUT VOTING

★Voter Eligibility

All qualified voters may vote on the school budget. A qualified voter is any U.S. citizen, 18 years of age or older on the day of the vote, who has resided in the District for 30 days or more days prior to the day of the vote. Voters registered with the Ulster County Board of Elections are automatically registered to vote in school elections.

★Absentee Ballots and New Early Mail Ballots

Absentee ballots are also available for any qualified voter who is unable to make it to the polls on the day of the vote. A new voter law has also been enacted allowing voting by Early Mail Ballots for all elections. Under the provisions of this new legislation, eligible voters may now apply for, obtain, and cast an Early Mail Ballot in advance of the annual budget vote and school board election.

Applying for an Absentee or Early Mail Ballot

To obtain either an Absentee Ballot or an Early Mail Ballot, an eligible voter must first fill out an application. Absentee Ballot and Early Mail Ballot applications can be:

- printed from the District's website
- picked up in person at the District Office (located at 1 Eugene L. Brown Drive, New Paltz) during regular school hours
- requested by emailing a letter to the District Clerk at sermo@newpaltz.k12.ny.us

Please note, the "Application for Absentee Ballot" requires an applicant to indicate a qualifying reason. By law, the voter's original signature is required on the application, so it must be either delivered to the District Clerk by mail or in person (applications cannot be accepted electronically).

Casting an Absentee or Early Mail Ballot

Upon receipt of a completed application, a ballot will be issued. Absentee Ballots issued by the District Clerk in person may only be given to the voter. Early Mail Ballots issued by the District Clerk in person may be given to either the voter or the voter's authorized agent set forth in the application.

If the voter is requesting to have a ballot sent to them by mail, applications must reach the District Clerk by May 14. If the voter is collecting their ballot in person, applications must be received by May 20.

To be cast, a completed ballot must be received by the District Clerk by the strict deadline of 5 PM on Tuesday, May 21.










Holidays Around the World


