Online Evaluation Guidelines

"You ARE what you know." Question what you read, especially from the Internet.

Credible sources/authority Who posted this information?
Read the URL (Uniform Resource Locator), which is the unique address of a Web site. The most common domains in a URL are listed below. They still have to be evaluated.
.com = commercial site (commercial sites vary in their credibility) - may be biased .net = now used the same as a .com site - may be biased .org = an organization, often a not-for-profit site - may be biased .gov = United States government - mostly reliable with factual information .edu = a school or university in the United States - mostly reliable
Can you find the name of the author (person or organization) that posted the information? Hint: Look at the top and bottom of the page to find an author. Look for tabs "About," "Contact," "Home" for an author.
