

**Q.** Why did you start teaching band?

**A.** I started teaching band because I liked band teachers when I was a student. I enjoyed playing music with my friends and being part of an organization that existed for that reason.

**Q.** Is it hard to teach 6, 7, and 8<sup>th</sup> graders?

**A.** If kids trust you and understand that you're trying to help them, not only with their music, but with life in general, they enjoy being with you. So I try to do that and I feel I have a very good relationship with my students.

**Q.** Do you enjoy teaching?

**A.** I enjoy teaching because I get to share what I know about something that I am passionate about. You can't have any kind of occasion without music, can you?

**Q.** What instrument did you play?

**A.** I play all the instruments. I started on trombone, and then went on to guitar and piano. In college, I had to study all the instruments, including strings and voice.

**Q.** If yes, how old were you when you started?

**A.** I gave my first music lesson when I was 20 years old. I started as a music teacher when I was 21.

**Q.** For how long are you teaching?

**A.** I've taught for 42 years. I started teaching General Music in Saratoga Springs (1 year), Clifton Park (outside of Albany) for 5 years, Camden and Rockport, Maine (25 years). I came to New Paltz on March 5, 2001 and have taught here ever since.

**Q.** Were you ever a music teacher?

**A.** For all of my years in teaching except the first, I've been a band teacher. Most of those years were spent in Middle School, but I also taught High School for 11 years as well.

**Q.** Do you think you're a good band teacher?

**A.** I think I'm a good band teacher because I have a pretty good idea of what's important in learning to play instruments in a band but, more importantly, I care about the students that I teach.

A special speaker, Superintendent Mrs. Rice, said "I am very proud that 22 students got this very special award."







I would give this book five stars because of the superb detail, suspense and an overall sense of adventure that makes you feel as if you are inside the story!




Students wrote what they appreciated about each other in language arts and English classes. Then they made a put-up card about the person and all are displayed outside the cafeteria.





- They celebrated the first Thanksgiving Day at Plymouth, Massachusetts.

# Thanksgiving Recipes:

## Rice Krispies Turkey

### Ingredients:

- 3 tablespoons [butter](#) or 3 tablespoons [margarine](#)
- 10 ounces [miniature marshmallows](#)
- 6 cups Plain Rice Krispies or 6 cups COCOA KRISPIES® cereal
- red licorice
- fruit licorice
- candy corn
- 1 cup [chocolate chips](#), melted.
- wooden skewers or toothpick

### Directions:

1. Follow the Rice Krispies Treats recipe on the cereal box.
2. Drop heaping spoonfuls of the mixture onto waxed paper and let them sit until they're cool enough to handle.
3. For each turkey body, create a ball the size of a fist. The heads should be about the size of golf balls. Stick the heads to the bodies. (Coat your hands with butter or cooking spray if the mixture gets too sticky.)
4. To make feathers, thread licorice onto the skewers or toothpicks. Poke about six into the back of each turkey. Use the melted chocolate chips as "glue" by pouring the melted chocolate into a ziploc bag and snipping a tiny hole in one corner. Use this to attach the following items: for eyes, use the marshmallows with chocolate for pupils; for the beak and feet, use candy corn; for the wattle under the bird's neck, use licorice.

Makes about six to eight turkeys.

A. Because I love Geography!


The club meets on Thursdays in room 1.


