that they are in charge of themselves and they are more capable of making controlled good decisions.

Q: *Do you enjoy your job and why?*

Ms. Rooney: I love my job! I love the fact that every day is different. I also enjoy working with such a talented group of teachers.

Sixth Grade Mohonk Trip



Spread throughout the first three weeks of October, sixth grade science classes went to the Mohonk Mountain House to test the pH of different water

sources that had been affected by acid rain.

After a 5-10 minute bus ride, students went to the recreation pavilion and tested rainwater that was collected early in September. Once they had determined their results, they walked to the hotel **dock on** Mohonk Lake and tested water from the top and bottom of the lake. Also tested was water from Lake Awosting that had been collected two months earlier.

Students then hiked to Skytop, by the reservoir, and ate lunch by the old fire tower. They were then allowed to go up the tower and walk around by it. After testing at the reservoir, students walked to Lily Pond and took observations using four of their five senses.

The result of their experiments was then discussed. Apparently, the bottom material of the lakes, including the rocks quartz conglomerate and shale, was affecting the way acid rain was changing the lakes; it was making them less acidic.

After they left, some students seemed sad since this was their last trip to Mohonk. However, this trip was definitely one of their favorites!

Egg Lab Project

Some of the New Paltz Middle School's seventh and eighth grade science classes were able to do an Egg Lab. In this lab students created a contraption that could be dropped from a three-story building with an egg that must not break. This lab took place everywhere around the school from September 29th-October 8th.

The rules of this lab were: no parachutes, and no padding at the bottom. It must be less than one pound, and it must be one piece and self-contained. Students had to work with a partner.

If you are wondering how this could possibly work, the answer is simple. Rubbing two objects together creates friction. The more friction created, the slower an object moves (eventually coming to a stop). This friction slows down the egg, which helps keep the egg from breaking.

The following are some comments about the project: "Each class did an excellent job in getting all the projects dropped in one period. The students worked very efficiently," commented Mr. Devorkin.

"It was super fun!" said Caroline Stafford.
Jennica Cochrane remarked, "It was cool because I learned how to create friction with paper towel rolls."

"It was very interesting and creative. We had a great time and Mr. Devorkin is an awesome teacher," said one participant.


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Slabsides





Michael Fred Phelps was born on June 30, 1985 at 5:30 a.m. in Baltimore, Maryland. He was the first Olympian to ever win eight gold medals at a single Olympics. He broke the record in Beijing, China this year. The record was held by Mark Spitz for 36 years.

100 butterfly. He beat Milorad Cavic by 100th of a second.



ACID RAIN

Acid rain has been a question to a lot of scientist. How is it formed? What can we do to stop it, and the most



important question of all what is acid rain? Well Ms. Lerner's, Mrs. Graves' and Ms. Ritter's classes wanted to find out!

When fossil fuels like gasoline and oil areburned they give away oxides of sulfur, carbon, and also nitrogen from our cars and trucks. (Above). The oxides fuse with moisture in the air to form sulfuric acid, nitric acid, and carbonic acid. When it precipitates (rain, snows, ECT.) it falls down to the earth which is called acid rain. That is how it is formed!



The effects of acid rain can be dangerous to many forms of life, including our lives. Acid

rain in water kills all fish and other living things in the environment. In the early 1990s thousands and thousands of bodies of water in Norway, Sweden and northeastern North America, became "dead" by acid rain. The acid rain also damaged mountains and trees (Picture to the left botton) in Vermont and other states. Some of the effects to us are asthma, heart disease, and emphysema. (This is a lung disease that involves damage to the air sacs in the lungs.) It also burns the faces of statues. (Picture below)




How can we reduce acid rain? Well, you can stop driving cars and start riding bikes. You can also turn off the water when you brush your teeth and when you're putting soap on your hands. The state can reduce acid rain by reducing power plants which means that we'll be cutting acid rain in half. Please be sure to do all of those things to reduce and maybe stop acid rain. 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


