Sepsis

This month I want to share some valuable information about sepsis. Sepsis is a medical condition which results from an immune system response to an infection. According to the National Institute of Health, sepsis is currently the leading cause of death for infants and children worldwide. Sepsis became much more well known with the tragic death of a 12 year old boy from Queens, NY named Rory Stanton. Rory was a healthy 12 year old boy that fell and cut his arm in gym class. Within 3 days, he had passed away from complications of sepsis which were caused by the cut he sustained in gym class.

Cuts, scrapes, urinary tract infections, and post-operative infections can all lead to sepsis. Some symptoms of sepsis include, but are not limited to:

- Rapid breathing and fast heart beat
- Pale or mottled skin
- Confusion or sleepiness
- Fever and chills
- Feeling the sickest you've ever felt
- Extreme pain

The easiest way to reduce the risk of acquiring sepsis is to practice good hygiene such as washing hands regularly, and using basic first aid techniques when caring for minor cuts and/or scrapes.
